

Connecting them with rewarding and fulfilling careers enables them to support their families at this critical time.

When fathers are absent, children are more likely to become young parents, dropouts, juvenile delinquents and grow up in poverty. But when Dad is present, the result is healthy children, healthy families, and healthy communities.

The year 2022 was a year of continued service and commitment to strengthening the lives of fathers. Of course, it was not without challenges, such as the many restraints caused by COVID-19. Still, the Center was able to carry out its God-guided ministry and meet the needs of many fathers. Many thanks to our dedicated board, staff, valued donors, partners and supporters.

Last year also brought a transition in leadership. The Center's long-time president, Pat Littlejohn, who led the fatherhood effort in excellence, retired. In came Karriem Edwards, who has brought great energy, passion, strategic thinking and an infectious outlook to the Center. 

FATHER STORY

RODERICK JACKSON

From a welding worker on child support to an involved father and successful entrepreneur, Roderick Jackson was a 32-year-old father from Florence, South Carolina with no vision or guidance in getting help for himself or his family. This is the story of how he overcame child support, employment, and physical difficulties to become a better dad.

Roderick's story starts in 2017 when he had just been released from jail for failure to pay child support. At the time, he had four young daughters to support. He knew that the mother had filed for child support, but he continued to attend court hearings and do his best to provide for his family. However, he was struggling and didn't know where to turn for help. While attending a court hearing, Roderick crossed paths with Mr. Lightfoot, an intervention specialist with Man2Man who inspired him to give the Fatherhood program a try.

Over the next six months, Roderick attended every session, even when it was difficult to find a babysitter for his baby girl, Corlisayana. He brought her with him to group events, and the other fathers quickly fell in love with her. Roderick's reliability and involvement at the sessions and events did not go unnoticed by the staff. Despite his busy schedule, Roderick always made time to attend the sessions and be present with the other dads.

Roderick had a way of giving valuable advice and input that really helped the other fathers stay motivated in the program.

“Once I came, I liked it! It was kind of a good thing to have a lot of people to sit around and do that and hear each other's struggles. Some of us were the same. Some were a lot different. Makes you look at things differently.”

Roderick had come a long way since starting the Man2Man program. Completing the program was a huge milestone for him, but it was just the beginning of his journey toward a better life. With a polished resume in hand, Roderick was able to secure a job in the welding industry thanks to Man2Man. It took several jobs placements for Roderick to find the right fit, but the fatherhood staff continued to help him navigate the challenges of his new job and provided support as he worked to build a stable life for himself and his family. Things were starting to look up for Roderick. His child support payments were on track, he had stable housing, and he was able to be an active presence in his children's lives. He even had time to indulge in his favorite hobbies, riding four-wheelers and dirt bikes in his spare time. During the holiday season of 2017, Roderick got

into a car accident, almost losing his leg. While he didn't initially realize the severity of his injury, he would have to undergo various levels of physical therapy and rehabilitation. Recovering from this injury would take some time but Roderick was determined to do whatever it took to get back to supporting his family. After several weeks, the therapist reported that he was fully recovered. Roderick's persistence to get back out and active was strong.

Through it all, Roderick remained focused on his goal: to be a better father for his growing family of seven children. He used the communication skills he learned in the program to build a stronger relationship with his third oldest daughter, who he hasn't seen since she was a toddler. Roderick used his new skills to be an active and involved parent to his other six children, spending time with them and showing them the love and support they needed to thrive. He even led a Man2Man “New Fathers” workshop for fathers in the community who were becoming new fathers or had newborns.

Today, Roderick Jackson, age 38, has transformed his life with the help of Man2Man's fatherhood program. He is now a devoted father to seven children, a successful entrepreneur and a strong advocate for fatherhood. Even after completing the program, he remains connected to the organization and its staff, seeking guidance, and offering mentorship to new program participants. Roderick's journey is a testament to the positive impact that fatherhood programs can have on the lives of individuals and their families.






REALITY CHECK
