### Dillon: A Child with Special Needs Glets the Glasses He Needs

Jeremy\* was a 13-year old middle school student when he was referred to Healthy Learners because of difficulty seeing. Jeremy had a few mental and physical challenges, including autism. He was nervous for his optometrist appointment, but was able to perform a preliminary test, which revealed he needed glasses. He became more nervous when the doctor tried to examine him and he was unable to complete the exam. The Healthy Learners staff members who took him to the appointment were able to have him select a pair of glasses and then try the exam again—with the same result. Returning to school, they spoke to the school nurse and his teacher. They were both concerned and understood that Jeremy really needed glasses. They scheduled another appointment and had a familiar face, his teacher, also there. With her encouragement, the doctor was able to complete the exam. Healthy Learners ordered the glasses he had picked out and delivered them to him at school, gently placing them on his head. His teacher observed how to place his glasses on so they could help him in the future. With his vision greatly improved, he was excited and thrilled to show off his new glasses.

### Georgetown: A Trip to the Dentist and a Vision Exam Change a Student's Life

High school student Kevin\* was suffering from toothaches. His family did not have dental insurance, so the school nurse referred him to Healthy Learners. Healthy Learners scheduled an emergency dental appointment, which revealed that he needed 11 fillings and two tooth extractions. Healthy Learners also helped Kevin's dad apply for Medicaid. After

During a

wellness visit with his local health care provider, Kevin failed a vision screening, so he was again referred to Healthy Learners by his school nurse. This time, Healthy Learners scheduled an appointment with a local vision care provider and transported him as well, where he received a pair of glasses. Kevin recently went for his annual sixmonth dental check-up and is cavity free. Kevin's dad and school nurse report that his self-esteem has improved greatly and he smiles more after receiving proper dental care. According to Kevin, he has even more reason to smile as his grades have improved dramatically thanks to his new glasses. +



## SPECIAL IRA GIVING OPPORTUNITY COULD PROVIDE YOU WITH TAX BENEFITS

A popular IRS provision allows those age 70½ or older to make charitable gifts directly from Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) to qualified charities completely free of federal income tax (in any amount up to \$100,000 per person per year). ## Program Updates

Five programs serve 150 schools across South Carolina. Following are brief updates from these programs.

**ALLENDALE** — Healthy Learners Allendale has been serving children in Allendale County Schools for 13 years! The program continues to seek out new partnerships and support to enhance its ability to meet the unmet health needs of all students. The highest service used this school year has been medication assistance with episodic needs second. Program Manager Shelley Thomas said the program is fortunate to "work with a group of nurses, teachers and administrators who sincerely care about the children and are not hesitant to find a way to get them the help they need."

**DILLON**— Healthy Learners Dillon continues to serve students in Dillon District Three and Four. The top services provided are vision, medication and counseling, with dental services growing because of poor dental health. Through a partnership with Smiles for a Lifetime, the program transports students from Latta (Dillon 3) and Lake View (Dillon 4) to the Smiles for a Lifetime dental clinic located on the Dillon High School campus. One objective for school year 2018-19 is to focus on the dental needs of kindergarten and 4-year-old kindergarten students in Latta and Lake View, which is happening by working closely with the schools to provide access to dental care and transportation to appointments.

**GEORGETOWN**— The Georgetown program hosted another successful Songwriters in the Round fundraiser event (pictured below) in April, with attendees treated to performances by talented Nashville singer songwriters in an intimate setting. In January, Healthy Learners Georgetown will be celebrating 10 years of serving the children of Georgetown County. The program continues to seek ways to serve the children in the community by partnering with other organizations and participating in the Health Care Collaborative for Children and Youth (HCCCY). This school year, the program began a new partnership with school nurses in the Georgetown County School District to assist with student health screenings.

**GREENWOOD**— Healthy Learners Greenwood is experiencing growth in all three school districts (50, 51 and 52), with the number of students referred this school year 46 percent higher than last school year for the same time period.



### Partner Profile

#### GEORGETOWN COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT



School nurses are priceless partners in fulfilling the mission of Healthy Learners. They are the people who most often identify children who need healthcare services and lack the resources to obtain

those valuable services. Healthy Learners Georgetown is fortunate to have Laura Tucker, lead school nurse at Georgetown County School District (GCSD), as a partner and advocate. Laura became a GCSD school nurse in 2004 and has served as lead school nurse since 2009, overseeing nursing at nearly 20 schools in the district. She has served on both the Healthy Learners Board of Trustees and Friends of Healthy Learners Georgetown.

Under her leadership, school nurses in GCSD are trained and encouraged to identify children in need and without resources and refer them to Healthy Learners for services. She and program manager, Aixa Rodriguez-Mariani, communicate and update each other frequently to continue improving services to the children of Georgetown County.

"I was a school nurse before Itealthy Learners came to Georgetown. I remember what it was like having so many children with needs that we were unable to meet," said Tucker. "After having Itealthy Learners all these years, it is hard to imagine (and I don't want to think about) not having such a valuable partner in meeting the numerous health care needs of our students."

Healthy Learners thanks Tucker and all the GCSD school nurses of Georgetown County Schools, as well as school nurses across South Carolina, for their partnership and commitment to meeting the health care needs of so many children in the state. •

#### M. John Heydel Honored with 2018 Champion for Children Award

M. John Heydel was awarded the 2018 Healthy Learners Champion for Children Award at the golf tournament. The award honors an individual who has served as an advocate for children and brought attention to the needs of underserved children in the community. Heydel was one of the visionaries behind the establishment of Healthy Learners in 1992 and has demonstrated his long-term commitment to increasing access to healthcare for children by continuing to be involved for more than 25 years.

#### Spelling Bee Raises Thousands for Healthy Learners Greenwood

More than 200 spellers showed off their spelling skills at the fourth annual Greenwood Friends of Healthy Learners Adult Spelling Bee held in September, raising more than \$40,000 for Healthy Learners Greenwood. By the time the final word, "suffrutescent," was reached, three of 61 teams remained: Ware Shoals District 51, First Baptist Church and representatives from the Links at Stoney Point's Bermuda's Restaurant. The Ware Shoals educators missed just three of 42 words, which earned them first place and bragging rights for a year. The spelling bee has steadily grown since it began in 2015, when there were 36 teams. Becky McIntosh, fund development coordinator, attributes the success to a number of factors. "Anyone can participate as part of a team of four and it is education oriented, which fits with Healthy Learners. We have a strong group of volunteers who ensure the event is well organized and moves quickly. Most importantly, it's just plain fun," she added.
