Effective Suicide Screening and Assessment in the Emergency Department Act of 2021

Issue Overview

Suicide rates have increased significantly since 1999 in the United States. The most significant risk factors for suicidal behavior are mental health disorders and substance use disorders. Environment can also impact suicidal behavior through stressful life events and access to weapons or drugs. With this growing issue that impacts large populations of people, there is a need for reform in identification and assessment of suicidal behaviors in order to proactively try to offer the correct services for people who have these behaviors.

This act, paired with several other acts surrounding mental health care, aims to offer help for people who are struggling with mental health. This act is trying to be proactive in offering resources for people who have suicidal thoughts as a preventative means.

The House of Representatives has set a bill in motion regarding suicidal screening and assessment in the emergency department. The details of that bill can be found below.

House of Representatives Bill H.R. 1324

Effective Suicide Screening and Assessment in the Emergency Department Act of 2021

This bill offers an amendment to the Public Health Service Act to establish a program that improves the identification, assessment, and treatment of patients that are at risk of suicide in hospital emergency departments.

This bill was passed by the House of Representatives on May 12, 2021. It is waiting further approval and implementation.
